Confirmed keynote speakers are:

Prof. Dr. Joaquín Arango Vila-Belda is Professor and Chair, Department of Sociology II, Complutense University of Madrid, and Director, Center for the Study of Migration and Citizenship, Instituto Universitario de Investigación Ortega y Gasset. He has been Director of the Spanish National Centre for Sociological Research, President of the Board of Directors of the European Centre for Research and Documentation in Social Sciences ('Vienna Centre'), and Chair of the Experts Group on Imbalances in the Mediterranean of the Council of Europe. He studied at the University of California, Berkeley (Ph.D. Candidate in Economic History) and holds a Ph.D. in Political Science and Sociology from the Complutense University of Madrid. His publications in matters of migration, in English, include for example: "Theories of International Migration", en Danièle Joly, ed., *International Migration in the New Millenium. Global Movement and Settlement (2004)*; *Worlds in Motion. Understanding International Migration at the End of the Millennium*, with Douglas Massey et al. (1998 and 2005); 'Becoming a Country of Immigration at the End of the XXth Century: the case of Spain', in R. King, G. Lazaridis and C. Tsardanidis, eds., *Eldorado or Fortress? Migration in Southern Europe (1999)*; the edition, with M. Baldwin-Edwards, of *Immigrants and the Informal Economy in Southern Europe (1999)*.

Prof. Dr. Amelie F. Constant is the Executive Director of DIW DC in Washington DC and a visiting professor at the Elliott School of International Affairs at George Washington University. She is also the Vice Dean of the Graduate Center at the German Institute for Economic Research (DIW) in Berlin and the Deputy Program Director of Migration at IZA in Bonn. Her research interests are in international migration, immigrant assimilation issues, gendered differences in labor market outcomes, occupational mobility, labor market segmentation, immigrant entrepreneurship in an intercountry setting, minorities and schooling quality and earnings. Her latest work deals with ethnic diversity, national identities, ethnic self-identification, risk attitudes, brain drain and remittances. While most of her empirical research is on migration in Germany, she has also done research on migration in France, Denmark, Italy, Greece and other EU countries, as well as the U.S. She has written over thirty five refereed articles and book chapters, published in many prestigious journals. She has won the Senior Prize Category of VdF/DIW for the best paper using the GSOEP during the period 2003-2004 and the Highly Recommended Paper Award at the Emerald Literati Network Awards for Excellence in 2007. She is the co-editor of the book *How Labor Migrants Fare?*, a volume of Research in Labor Economics, and of the special issue of the Journal of International Manpower.

Prof. Dr. Javier de Lucas is currently director of the *College d'Espagne* at the *Cité Internationale Universitaire de Paris* and Full Professor of Philosophy of Law and Moral and Political Philosophy at the University of Valencia. He is also the director of the Centre of Studies on Citizenship, Migration and Minorities of this University, and one of the most relevant European experts on Human Rights. He is a member of organizations as the European Academy of Legal Theory or the International Institute for the Sociology of Law. He is author of more than 200 works among books and papers about theory and philosophy of law and human rights, about political philosophy and legislative critique, especially on the obedience to the law, the objection of conscience and the solidarity, the racism and the xenophobia, the immigration, the rights of the minorities or the multiculturalism.

Prof. Dr. Guy S. Goodwin-Gill is a Senior Research Fellow of All Souls College, Oxford and Professor of International Refugee Law in the University of Oxford. He was formerly Professor of Asylum Law at the University of Amsterdam, and served as a Legal Adviser in the Office of United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) in various countries from 1976 to 1988. Since 1997, he has been President of the Refugee Legal Centre. Professor Goodwin-Gill is a Barrister and practices from Blackstone Chambers, London. He has written extensively on refugees, migration, elections, and child soldiers. Recent publications include: *The Refugee in International Law*, (OUP, 2007), 3rd edn. with Dr Jane McAdam; *Free and Fair Elections*, (Inter-Parliamentary Union, 2nd edn., 2006); *Basic Documents on Human Rights*, (OUP, 2006), 5th edn., with Ian Brownlie, eds.

Prof. Dr. Rubén G. Rumbaut is Professor of Sociology at the University of California, Irvine. An internationally known scholar of immigration and refugee movements, and a leading expert on immigration in the United States who has testified before the U.S. Congress on immigration reform, he is the founding chair of the Section on International Migration of the American Sociological Association, and a former member of the Committee on Population of the National Academy of Sciences, and the Committee on International Migration of the Social Science Research Council. A native of Havana, Cuba, Dr. Rumbaut directs (with Alejandro Portes) the landmark Children of Immigrants Longitudinal Study, begun in 1991; and serves as P.I. of the Immigration and Intergenerational Mobility in Metropolitan Los Angeles study. He is the author of more than 150 scientific articles and chapters in scholarly volumes on immigration issues. Among his books (with Portes) are the critically acclaimed *Immigrant America: A Portrait*; and two books based on CILS: *Ethnicities: Children of Immigrants in America*; and *Legacies: The Story of the Immigrant Second Generation*, which won the American Sociological Association's top awards for Distinguished Scholarship and for best book in the immigration field. With a panel of the National Academy of Sciences he worked on two recent volumes on the Hispanic population of the United States: *Multiple Origins, Uncertain Destinies*; and *Hispanics and the Future of America*. Among his other books are *Immigration Research for a New Century: Multidisciplinary Perspectives*; *Origins and Destinies: Immigration, Race and Ethnicity in America*; and *California's Immigrant Children: Theory, Research, and Implications for Educational Policy*. He also edits (with Steve Gold) a research-oriented book series, *The New Americans: Recent Immigration and American Society*; under their editorship more than sixty titles have been published since 2002 on a wide range of immigration topics.

Prof. Dr. Oded Stark is a Senior Fellow and Professor of Economics at the Center of Development Research, University of Bonn; a University Professor at the University of Klagenfurt; an Honorary Professor of Economics at the University of Vienna; a Distinguished Professor at Warsaw University and at the Warsaw School of Economics; and a Distinguished Fellow at the Center of Migration Research, Warsaw University. His past academic appointments include a Professor of Population and Economics and the Director of the

Migration and Development Program at Harvard University, and a Chair Professor of Development Economics at the University of Oslo. Professor Stark's main research interests include applied microeconomic theory, development economics, economics of migration, population economics, labor economics, urban economics, regional economics, evolutionary economics, and the theory of the firm. He is the author of the critically acclaimed books *The Migration of Labor* (Oxford and Cambridge, MA: Blackwell 1991 and 1993), and *Altruism and Beyond, An Economic Analysis of Transfers and Exchanges Within Families and Groups* (Cambridge: Cambridge University Press 1995 and 1999). Oded Stark is a Humboldt Awardee, and a Presidential Professor of Economic Sciences (Poland).
